The Liturgy of Ash Wednesday

The Gathering

The celebrant may say

The Greeting

The celebrant greets the people

Grace, mercy and peace
from God our Father
and the Lord Jesus Christ
be with you

All **and also with you.**

Introduction

The celebrant explains the meaning of Lent and invites the people to observe it faithfully

Brothers and sisters in Christ, since early days Christians have observed with great devotion the time of our Lord's passion and resurrection and prepared for this by a season of penitence and fasting.

By carefully keeping these days, Christians take to heart the call to repentance and the assurance of forgiveness

proclaimed in the gospel, and so grow in faith and in devotion to our Lord.

I invite you, therefore, in the name of the Church, to the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's holy word.

All **Holy God,
holy and strong,
holy and immortal,
have mercy upon us.**

The Collect

The celebrant introduces a period of silent prayer with the words

Let us pray for grace to keep Lent faithfully.

Silence is kept.

Holy God,
our lives are laid open before you:
rescue us from the chaos of sin
and through the death of your Son
bring us healing and make us whole
in Jesus Christ our Lord.

All **Amen.**

Readings

*Either one or two readings from Scripture precede the Gospel reading.
At the end of each the reader may say*

This is the word of the Lord.

All **Thanks be to God.**

Gospel Reading

When the Gospel is announced the reader says

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to *N*.
All **Glory to you, O Lord.**

At the end

This is the Gospel of the Lord.
All **Praise to you, O Christ.**

Sermon

A sermon or other interpretation of the readings may occur here.

Self-examination and Confession

A minister now leads a corporate examination of conscience.

Let us now call to mind our sin and the infinite mercy of God.

God the Father,

Trinity of Love,

Accomplish in us the work of your salvation,

All **that we may show your glory in the world.**

By the cross and passion of your Son our Lord,
**bring us with all your saints to the joy of his
resurrection.**

Silence

May the Father forgive us by the death of his Son and strengthen us to live in the power of the Spirit all our days.

All **Amen.**

Imposition of Ashes

The celebrant invites the people to approach the Holy Table to receive the sign of the cross in ash. During the imposition a hymn or anthem may be sung, a psalm sung or said, or silence may be kept.

As a sign of the spirit of penitence with which we shall keep this season of preparation for Easter, I invite you to receive these ashes on your head in the form of the cross, the sign of our salvation.

All **God our Father, you create us from the dust
of the earth:
grant that these ashes may be for us a sign of our
penitence and a symbol of our mortality;
for it is by your grace alone that we receive eternal
life in Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.**

The celebrant and people receive the imposition of ashes. At the imposition the minister says to each person

Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return.
Turn away from sin and be faithful to Christ.

The Peace

Since we are justified by faith, we have peace with God.

The Liturgy of Maundy Thursday

In this service we recall the meal which our Lord Jesus ate with his disciples on the night before he died. The service, like that night itself, reaches its climax in chaos, with the stripping of the altar. A silent watch follows until 10pm. Otherwise the service closes with our departure in complete silence.

The Greeting

The celebrant greets the people

The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ,
the love of God,
and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit
be with you

All **and also with you.**

Prayers of Penitence

A minister uses this Invitation to Confession

Our Lord Jesus Christ says:

‘If you love me, keep my commandments’.

‘Unless I wash you, you have no part in me’.

Let us confess to almighty God our sins against his love,
and ask him to cleanse us from their guilt and stain.

Silence

Have mercy on us, O God, in your great goodness;
according to the abundance of your compassion
blot out our offences.

Lord, have mercy.

The Washing of Feet

During the washing of feet a hymn, anthem or psalm may be sung.

The washing of feet may end with this prayer

Lord Jesus Christ, you have taught us
 that what we do for the least of our brothers and sisters
 we also do for you:
 give us the will to be the servant of others
 as you were the servant of all,
 and gave up your life and died for us,
 but are alive and reign, now and for ever.

All **Amen.**

Prayers of Intercession
